Grade 5 Library - LA Picturing Change with Art

Targeted Goals from Stage 1: Desired Results

Students will be able to analyze art in picture books to think more critically

Content Knowledge: Stories can help us better understand worldly communities, cultures, life experiences, and family dynamics.

Vocabulary: Lines, Shapes, Color, Perspective, Lightness/Darkness, Author's Message, Setting, Mood, Character, Foreshadowing, Suspense, and Plot, mirrors and windows

Skills: Analyze how visuals/art elements are used to help communicate story elements.

Expectation: Each student will read/listen to A Different Pond by Bao Phi and illustrated by Thi Bui. Students will identify an art element and how it impacts the story.

Description of Task (s):	Resources and Materials:	Daily Checks (Return to Google Classroom or snapshots from a cell phone)
Readers, you have been studying picture books and using them as mirrors to see yourselves in the characters, the plot, the setting and the conflicts or as windows to better understand the world and the people that make up our world. Please read A Different Pond by Bao Phi and illustrated by Thi Bui, a Caldecott Honor (available electronically as a Read Along - directions to access below). Look at the art. Look at the art elements: Shape, Line, Color, Lightness/Darkness, and Perspective.	Google Form Capstone library	Turn in completed Google form

Description of Task (s):	Resources and Materials:	Daily Checks (Return to Google Classroom or snapshots from a cell phone)
<p>The art elements help support the following story elements:</p> <p>Author's message/purpose</p> <p>Setting (time and place)</p> <p>Mood (feeling)</p> <p>Character (feelings, actions, thoughts, point of view)</p> <p>Foreshadowing (hint to what's to come)</p> <p>Suspense</p> <p>Plot (the action in the story)</p> <p>As you read/listen to the book, look at the art elements and answer the questions below on how they support the story. For example, in the book <i>Where the Wild Things Are</i> the Lines crisscross all over the page, show the fantasy world for Setting. In <i>Pardon Me</i>, the Color red shows the character's Mood - anger when all the animals wouldn't leave him alone.</p>		

Week criteria for success (attach student checklists or rubrics): Students are successful if they are able to identify an art element, story element and how they impacted the story.

Supportive resources and tutorials for the week (plans for re-teaching): Communicate directly with students who need support. Provide more examples.
