## **American Literature - The College Narrative**

## **Targeted Goals from Stage 1: Desired Results**

Students will: Reflect on the Common **Application essay** prompts and brainstorm how each prompt has played a part in their own life; engage in free-writing personal narratives.

**Content Knowledge:** Uses writer's tools including vivid action verbs; transitions for fluency; exemplifies three C's of writing: clear, concise, correct; free of mechanical and grammatical errors.

**Vocabulary: Mission Statement** (A mission statement defines the basic reason for the existence of that organization. ... It should be feasible. A mission should always aim high but it should not be an impossible statement. It should be realistic and achievable its followers must find it to be credible); **Core Values** (Core values are the fundamental beliefs of a person or organization. These guiding principles dictate behavior and can help people understand the difference between right and wrong. Core values also help companies/institutions to determine if they are on the right path and fulfilling their goals by creating an unwavering guide). FYI: Both of these are often helpful to review whether you are applying to a college or a job. You can tailor your essay/cover letter so you portray how you fit in with those values/goals.

**Skills:** Brainstorming; mapping; incorporating specifics; defining personal traits/qualities for a personal narrative
